Q:.. What are the "quals" on my masterpoint insert in the ACBL Bulletin?

A: Those are qualifications—Blue, Red, or Silver—you have earned for play in major pair events at national championships.

Blue Ribbon Pairs is a six-session event held at the Fall North American Bridge Championship, and is the premier event for pairs. You earn qualification to play in the event by finishing in the overalls in all Gold Point Regionally-rated events (except continuous pairs) with no upper masterpoint limit or with a limit of more than 1500 masterpoints. You can also qualify with first or second in a knockout event if your bracket issues 100% gold points (in multiple-bracket KOs, lower brackets may not award full gold points) and for an applicable team in any bracket having at least one member with more than 1500 masterpoints.

There are numerous other ways to qualify for the Blue Ribbon Pairs, most having to do with winning at a national or similar major events. The 100 players with the most masterpoints for the year as of Sept. 1 are qualified, and international stars may have special entry.

Over the past year one of the significant activities of the Unit Board has been to remodel the kitchen opening and counter top at DCBC to provide greater serving space and easier access. All past world champions are qualified.

Red Ribbon Pairs are held in the spring, and the first qualification is that you must have fewer than 2000 masterpoints as of the last confirmation card before the event. Other qualifications are similar to those for Blue Ribbon. Qualification for Red Ribbon may be earned in events with a masterpoint limit of 1500. It is a four-session event. A Blue Ribbon qualification may be used in the Red Ribbon Pairs.

Silver Ribbon Pairs are in the summer, and you must be age 55 or older to enter. Qualification is earned in Senior Pair events at regionals or nationals. A Blue or Red Ribbon qualification is also good for the Silver Ribbon Pairs, and Silver may be used in the Red Ribbon. It is also a four-session event.

Q: What is the rule of 11, and how does it work?

A: This is one of those things in bridge which you don't need to know how it works, just that it does. When your partner leads 4th best, you look at partner's spot card, and then at the number of higher cards of that suit in the dummy and in your own hand. Subtract partner's spot from 11, then deduct the cards higher than that number in your hand and dummy, and you know how many higher cards declarer holds.

For example, partner leads the 7 and you see K52 in dummy, and A1093 in your own hand. Subtracting 7 from 11 gives you four, and you can see the king in dummy and A109 in your hand: therefore, declarer has no cards in the suit higher than partner's 7.

Declarer can use the rule as well. The 6 is led, and your dummy comes down with AQ954. Right hand opponent plays the 3, and you hold 1072. Using the rule of 11 (11 minus 6 equals 5) you can see all the higher cards in your hand or dummy, so you know you can finesse opening leader for all the other high cards in the suit—the king, jack, eight.

You may spot a singleton using the rule. The 5 is led, and dummy has A10874, and you (leader's partner) have K932. The remainder is 6, and they are all in dummy or your hand. Since you can see the 4, 3, and 2, your partner is leading a singleton. Unfortunately, declarer, holding AJ6, can make the same calculation and come to the same conclusion.

If you must know why it works, Rodney Wilton has an answer. The ace in a deck is the one, but since it beats all the others, move it to the top of the pile and call it 14. Now, if the 5 is led, there are 8 cards higher than the 5, and 3 lower—the magic number of 11.

If you play third or fifth best leads, use a rule of 12 for what looks like fifth best, and 10 if the lead looks like third best.

Q: What are IMPs?

A: Stands for International Match Points, used in scoring team events. At one time, bridge team events were determined by total raw score achieved on each board. That placed a premium on the high-scoring results, such as a slam. Another form of team play, Board-A-Match, is still used but gives every board equal stature.

IMP scoring was devised in the 30s and the current scale developed in 1962. Your raw score—say 620—is converted to a number on the IMP scale. The table is on your convention cards. The general effect is to flatten the value of high scores and to heighten the value of part scores.

In Swiss Team matches, IMP scores are then converted to Victory Points, which is another scale and tends to eliminate the many ties which occurred with simple win-loss team events. There are several controversies concerning Victory Points, and some are discussed in recent issues of the ACBL Bulletin.

SECURITY AND PERSONAL PROTECTION

On October 17, 2006, Steve Sink, Security Consultant for the Albuquerque Police Department, gave a lecture to DCBC players regarding personal protection and security. His talk was funny, entertaining, yet sobering and informative. For those folks who missed this special event, the highlights are as follows:

Albuquerque is a city with one of the highest crime rates in America. What drives the crime here is Crystal Meth. Therefore, the places and routines that used to be considered safe are no longer so. Special care must be taken at all times, but especially during the holiday season. Crimes that are increasing in frequency include identity theft (which takes an average of 3 years to resolve), auto theft, fraud and con games, burglary and carjacking.

Steve recommends the following for your safety:

Away from your residence:

- 1. Always be aware of your surroundings and trust your instincts.
- 2. Be aware of other people around you and make note of their behavior.
- 3. Walk with authority and purpose while noticing people and activity around you.
- 4. Lock all personal items in the trunk or away from view--roll up windows, lock doors, and take keys.
- 5. Have your keys ready when approaching your vehicle (and residence) and do not have several items in your hands.
- 6. After securing your possessions in the vehicle, get in and lock the doors and keep doors locked until you arrive at your destination.
- 7. Park in well lit areas with a lot of activity. Park as close to the entrance as possible. Avoid carrying a purse at all times. Place wallet and/or money and credit cards in a front pocket or jacket pocket. Carry only items necessary for a particular outing.
- 8. If you must carry a purse, never leave it open; carry it close to your body with flap facing inward; and place strap around your shoulder (never wrap it around your body or neck).
- 9. If you carry a defensive object (pepper spray, etc.) have proper training first.
- 10. Use personal body alarm, whistle, etc.
- 11. Notify a trusted neighbor or family member where you are going and when you are expected back.
- 12. If you notice a suspicious person or activity in a parking lot near your car, return to the store and ask for an escort and notify security or store management.

In your vehicle:

- 1. Keep all doors locked.
- 2. Place purse and other valuables out of sight (when traveling and parked).
- 3. Don't travel in curbside lane, especially at a stoplight.
- 4. Be aware of your surroundings when stopped at a light—be aware of people approaching your car.

5. Don't stop too close to the car in front of you. Allow enough space to "pull out," and take evasive action.

- 6. If you are followed, drive to a safe, active, and well lit location (don't drive home) and quickly leave your vehicle and go inside to call the police and request assistance.
- 7. If you can't safely exit your vehicle, somehow make a commotion by honking your horn, flashing your lights, etc.
- 8. Use a cell phone to call the police, but don't let it distract your driving.
- 9. Avoid any confrontation while driving, no matter how minor.

At your residence:

- Get to know your neighbors and establish trusted relationships. Encourage them to watch out for you, your family and your residence. Consider starting a Neighborhood Watch program.
- 2. Make sure the lighting on the exterior of the residence illuminates the entire area.
- 3. Each entrance should have solid core or metal doors and deadbolt locks with a minimum of a one-inch throw.
- 4. All primary window locks should be operational and secondary locks should be installed.
- 5. Trim all bushes down and up from the ground. Trim trees up 6-8 feet from the ground.
- 6. Place lights, radios, and TV on timers to give the appearance someone is home when away.
- 7. Do not stop mail and newspaper delivery. Have a trusted neighbor collect them and place/remove trash carts in the typical location when away.
- 8. Let neighbors, family, and friends know when you will return from a trip.

Women are more vulnerable. You are especially vulnerable if you carry a purse.

- 1. Never carry a purse. If you just can't do without one, leave it in the trunk of your car. Carry three items with you—your driver's license, credit or debit card, and health insurance card. Place a rubber band around them and place in a front pocket, knee high hose, or other creative place. Do not leave anything in the purse with personal identifiers.
- 2. Men should do the same. Wallets in your hip pocket are easy targets for pick pockets.
- 3. Fanny packs are little better than purses. They "announce" to potential thieves that you have "stuff".

Important Phone Numbers:


<u>911 Emergency:</u> An emergency call should be placed when a person's life or property is in danger or threatened. In-progress calls are placed when crimes are being committed at the time of your report. These calls are free on pay phones.

<u>242-COPS (2677) Non-emergencies:</u> A non-emergency call is made when a person's life and/or property is not in immediate danger. Included under this definition are crimes involving property, crimes against persons where the victim is not injured and offenders are not at or near the scene. However, a police officer is needed to respond to investigate and take a report.

<u>768-2020</u> Police Information: When information is needed, such as Police Department telephone numbers, report inquiries, or general police information, dial this number. If a police report is needed and an officer is not required at the scene, you may make a police report over the phone.



Armstrong, SOLUTION TO LOOK FOR THE PITFALLS



Counting tricks, you have five spades, three hearts and two clubs for a total of ten. Counting losers, there is one heart, one diamond and one club for a total of three. So what's the problem?

The problem is that if you ruff this diamond you are down to to four trumps in your hand. If trumps break 3-2 there is nothing to worry about. Just draw trumps and knock out the ace of hearts.

However we all know that sometimes trumps break 4-1, especially if the opponents have been leaping around vulnerable.

What is to become of you if trumps break 4-I and you ruff the second diamond? You certainly can't draw trumps and then play a heart. You will have exhausted all your trumps and all their diamonds will be good.

You will have to work with the hearts before drawing all the trumps and if they duck the ace once they may be able to engineer a heart ruff and down you will go.

The answer is to discard a club at trick two, a sure loser in any case. If they continue diamonds you will be able to ruff in dummy while preserving all five trumps in your hand. They are more likely to shift to a club, which you win. Then draw four rounds of trumps and knock out the ace of hearts.
