## President's Column

I have written several columns describing the functions of an ACBL "Unit" as opposed to an ACBL "Club". Because the Unit holds many of its bridge activities at the DCBC, members are often unclear about the difference between the two organizations. The Unit is Unit 374 of the ACBL and holds a regular Sunday game at DCBC. The DCBC is one of the clubs belonging to our unit. It is our landlord, owns its own building and runs its own games on other days of the week. When you join the ACBL you automatically become a member of Unit 374, which includes four duplicate bridge clubs and has more than 600 members in the Albuquerque area. The Unit board usually meets the second Sunday of every month. These meetings, which are open to anyone who wants to attend, are where the ongoing Unit activities are planned and coordinated. You don't have to be a member of the Unit board, however, to participate in the events described below and we welcome everyone who wants to get involved and help out. Many of the people mentioned are not board members but still volunteer their time, and we are grateful for their participation. The Unit 374 members elect a board of directors whose mission is to plan and conduct bridge activities such as the following:



### **Special Events (Socials, Lessons and Seminars)**

The recent **Shampagne Brunch**, held in conjunction with a Sunday Unit game, raised more than \$1000 for the Assistance League. Unit members Rick Weigle, Sue Zimmerman and Jean Richmond prepared and served the food which was purchased by the Unit (and an anonymous donor). All entry fees were donated to this charity which has also been designated as our local charity to support throughout the year.

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## ASKAL

**Q: Is it legal to open the bidding with less than 10 points?**

**A:** Yes, it is legal. But if you routinely open with 11 or less, according to the ACBL alert chart, you must pre-alert. That is, you inform your opponents at the beginning of each round that you open light. "Routinely" would be more than a couple times a session.

Similarly, if you overcall at the two level with less than 10 points on a regular basis, as with all bids that are considered unusual or highly aggressive, you must alert. Moreover, conventional bids with a specified point range may not deviate at the lower end. For example, if you play Flannery with an announced range of 11-15 high card points, you may not open with only 10 points, and are subject to penalty if you do. If you think you might occasionally wish to open with only 10, you could mark your card for Flannery as showing (10)11-15 hcp.

ACBL regulations make no distinction between first and third seat bidding.

**Q: Do you have some favorite tips?**

**A:** Of course. In no particular order:

She has received the support of many Unit members who provide hospitality and help make the event run smoothly by handling partnerships, caddies and finances.

It is also not too early to remind you that the **Navajo Trail Regional** will be held January 18-24, 2010 at the Albuquerque Marriott Pyramid North. This is another Unit-sponsored event. Recently, it has been the profit from this tournament which has contributed to some of the activities listed above. It is our way of paying back the Albuquerque bridge players that support Unit activities.

**OTHER NEWS**

This is a good time to remind all Unit members of the upcoming Unit board elections. Each year five of the ten Unit board members are replaced by new or incumbent members elected to serve a two year term. Forget a bad result. If it was caused by your own error, nothing is better for partnership relations than acknowledging your mistakes. But don't dwell on errors by either yourself or your partner. Forget it by the time you look at your next hand. All post mortems should be for the purpose of improving your game or partnership. Too often, I've seen players earn a second bad result by still thinking about the previous board. And don't try to win the board back on the next hand by some risky bidding or play. That seldom works.

Don't give up on a hand when you know you are in a terrible contract. If you can save even one trick, that may earn a matchpoint (or an IMP in a team game). Events can be won or lost by one point.

Learn some of the basic rules, and when to take advantage of the opponents' infractions. Most players know about revokes and that it is to their advantage to call the director. But many do not know what to do if their right hand opponent makes a bid out of turn or insufficient bid. The general rule is do not accept the bid, and call the director. But there are times when it can be to your advantage to accept the bid by RHO. For example, your partner is dealer, but RHO opens one spade out of turn, and you hold something like S—xx, H-x, D—Kxxxx, C—Ajxxx

That is a classic unusual no trump hand, and RHO's bid out of turn gives you the chance to tell your entire story to partner in one bid. Who knows what might happen if you let the bidding revert to partner, who might open with something like 3 hearts. Partners are like that. Or perhaps you have a nice Michaels bid over one spade. It is perfectly legal and ethical to take advantage of an opponent who breaks a rule. Sometimes, you can break a rule yourself and avoid the worst penalty. When you revoke, it can be a two-trick adjustment if you win another trick with a card you could have played then. But perhaps you can arrange to let partner (or dummy) win that trick, and have only one trick taken away. You need to know the rules, and know when to use them to your advantage.

Try to know your opponents. That only comes from playing them, but you can learn which players bid too much, or not enough; which players are far more likely to double you for penalty than others; or when you can overbid a little. Expert players see more options in the play, so perhaps you can be deceptive against them. Learn which players make the most mistakes, or take risks, and which are steady opponents who can be relied on to do the right thing most of the time. Pay attention to what happens at the table.

Play up if you want to become a better player. If you are a

Norm was preceded in death by his wife, Bess, who passed on in 1984. They were married 48 years. He lived independently and drove until age 99. He then moved in with Rob and Luc.

beginner, and have a chance to player in a higher level game (especially at a tournament, where there are more bracketed events), take the opportunity. If you are an intermediate player, play in the open game. I don't mean every day that you play, but at least occasionally. If you play three times a week, try playing up once a week. You learn from better players who know more. And don't be afraid to ask questions. The best players are happy to answer.

Trust your partner. Your partner is trying to help you bid to the best spot. Defense is particularly difficult, so you need all the help you can get. Partner's signals are the best help (in addition to thinking). You need to listen to the bidding, and decide if your partner can have enough high cards so that a signal is a virtual command, or just a suggestion. Give the best signals you can. Sometimes you have zero points, but you can at least give partner an accurate count of your cards in each suit. Trust that partner is doing the best he can. If not, look for a new partner.

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(After more than 10 years of writing this column, I've decided you need a new author in this space. I think I've written about as much as I can, so I'm retiring. Thanks for all your questions and your nice comments over the years. They have been greatly appreciated.)

REPORT FROM DCBC PROPERTY MANAGER

**Parking**

We have lost the parking spots on both sides of the street along Northeastern Blvd., in front of the DCBC. The Walgreens Pharmacy behind us has agreed to allow parking in the northeast corner of their parking lot, as long as we avoid the spaces that would interfere with a smooth flow of vehicular traffic through their pharmacy drive-up lane. The Western Commerce Bank continues to allow us to park on the eastern and southern edge of their parking lot. In addition, there are lots of parking spaces available to the north of the DCBC, in the new parking lots provided for the Walmart and strip-mall stores. Use common sense and park away from the front doors of these stores, and there should not be a problem. If you can't walk that far, get to the club early enough to find a space in the DCBC parking lot. There are handicapped spaces reserved for those that have an authorized placard. At the September board meeting, it was decided that approximately six more handicapped parking spaces will be provided in the DCBC lot. If you use one of these, you must display your handicapped placard so it is visible.

**Theft**

During the month of June, one of our members who was parked in our lot left a purse on the front seat of her car. When she left the DCBC, she discovered that the side window of her car had been broken and the purse stolen. This is another reminder not to leave valuables in view inside a locked vehicle. If you have valuables with you, put them in the trunk of the car before you arrive (thieves could be watching as you place them in the trunk in the parking lot).

Police officers at the substation that is responsible for our area want to know about any incidents of theft. It is important to file a report with them at 242-COPS (242-2677). The police will increase their surveillance of the DCBC if they know we have been targeted. We plan to inform the police of the dates of our sectionals or other large tournaments, as they have promised to increase their surveillance during those events. Also, tell the bridge director if you have been burglarized or you witness suspicious activities in or around the bridge club.

**Surveillance**

Another surveillance camera was installed in July. This now allows increased coverage of the parking lot. Everything that occurs is permanently recorded, for crime solving purposes.

**Prevention of Disease**

A very serious influenza season, including the "Swine Flu," has started. Please wash your hands as often as possible during play and especially after using the restroom. Bottles of hand sanitizer are available for your use. Also, please cover your mouth when sneezing or coughing. Do not place soiled tissues on the tables or floors. 
